The Down Syndrome Medical Interest Group-USA (DSMIG) encourages you to invite your health care professionals to participate in Down Syndrome Project ECHO.

WHAT IS THE DSMIG PROJECT ECHO?

The DSMIG Project ECHO is a monthly virtual meeting for health care professionals to learn and share information about the care of people with Down syndrome.

WHY WAS IT DEVELOPED?

Project ECHO was developed to support health care professionals who care for individuals with Down syndrome. Many people with Down syndrome do not have access to a specialty clinic for people with Down syndrome. They receive care from health care professionals who may not have much experience in caring for people with Down syndrome. This program provides an opportunity for these professionals to seek input from expert professionals with significant experience in caring for people with Down syndrome.

WHAT IS THE FORMAT?

Health care professionals who are seeking input on the care of a pediatric or adult person with Down syndrome will present a de-identified case.

WHO SHOULD ATTEND?

Health care professionals of individuals with Down syndrome are invited to attend. These may include physicians, nurse practitioners, physician assistants, psychologists, social workers, nurses, therapists, trainees in these professions, and others.

WHAT ARE THE COSTS?

There is no cost to participate in the program. Additionally, attendees can earn FREE continuing education credit.
